





What are the biggest challenges you experience related to watershed protection?






What water and/or watershed type projects are you engaged in?






Water and land protection 12.2%

~ Summary ~ What gaps do you see in the Sierra Nevada related to water/watershed health?

1. Insufficient and inconsistency in availability of **funding** for watershed health improvement projects across a wide range of types, including land protection, meadow restoration, forest management and wildfire mitigation, mine remediation, and managing recreational impacts.

2. A lack of statewide public **awareness, participation, and understanding** of the role the Sierra Nevada plays in water provisioning to the rest of the state(s), particularly in southern California. Insufficient understanding of the **value of water** as an ecosystem service, and **economic analysis** of the benefits and co benefits of water provisioning.

3. Low **capacity** of Sierra based organizations impacting our ability to coordinate, apply for state and specially federal funding opportunities, focus on planning, assessment, and monitoring activities, as well as our ability to support advocacy efforts to push for policies and budget that benefit the region.

5. Dearth of **workforce** to conduct watershed improvement work.

7.Lack of understanding about **climate impacts** to watershed health, including long term climate related impact of wildfire, extreme weather events, and cascading events.
